
Year 6 Coasts

abrasion	This is when pebbles grind along a rock platform, much like sandpaper. Over time the rock becomes smooth.
border/ boundary	The outer part or edge of a region or country that divides it from another.
deposition	When material/sediment is moved and dropped off in a different place.
dissolve	When a solid substance mixes with a lig- uid to make a solution.
erosion	When natural materials are wornaway and transported to a different place.
weathering	The process of wearing away rocks by the weather.










Can I?

Plymouth is a port city in Devon, southwest England. It's known for its maritime heritage and historic Barbican district with narrow, cobbled streets.



The percentage of coastlines vulnerable to erosion across the UK are 28% in England and Wales, 19.5% in Northern Ireland and 19% in Scotland.

Coastlines make up around 8 percent of the Earth's land, but they have about 26 percent of all biological diversity on our planet.

Arches form at headlands, where rocky coastlines jut out into the sea. Powerful waves pound into rock from both sides of the headland.
