


Things to talk about at home...





Exploring Plymouth's Historical and Geographical Wonders!

We are delighted to share our successful geography field trip taken by our Year 3 students from the Turtles and Sunfish classes. This week, our budding geographers embarked on an adventure to explore the local area of Plymouth, engaging in map work and identifying both physical and human features.

The journey began at Plymouth's historic Barbican, where the students marveled at the intricate lock leading to the marina. The lock mechanism provided a fantastic opportunity for them to observe human intervention in natural waterways and understand its significance in maritime activities.

Next, we made our way to the Mayflower Steps, where the students learned about the historic voyage of the Mayflower ship, which carried the Pilgrims to the New World in 1620. This was a fantastic opportunity to integrate history into our geography lesson, as the children discovered the significant role Plymouth played in this important event.

Our field trip continued with a visit to the Royal Citadel, a historic fortress that has stood guard over Plymouth for over 300 years. The students were captivated by the impressive structure and learned about its role in protecting the city from potential invaders.

Finally, we concluded our day at Smeaton's Tower, the iconic lighthouse that once stood on the Eddystone Rocks. This provided a fantastic opportunity to discuss the physical features of the coastline and the importance of lighthouses in maritime navigation.
